Baghdad road bomb kills 4 U.S. troops

BAGHDAD, Iraq — Four U.S. soldiers were killed Saturday by a roadside bomb while patrolling south Baghdad, the military said.

The military did not release any other details about the explosion or the identities of the soldiers.

At least 2,387 members of the U.S. military have died since the war began, according to an Associated Press count.

Meanwhile, U.S. and Iraqi forces fought an hourlong gun-battle with insurgents Saturday in Ramadi, west of the capital, firing automatic weapons from roof-

tops at small guerrilla teams maneuvering around them in alleyways and an abandoned fair-ground.

Four insurgents were killed and two Iraqi soldiers were wounded in the gunfight in eastern Ramadi. One was shot through the calf and evacuated by U.S. medics, and another suffered a minor facial wound, U.S. commanders said.

As Iraqi forces swept through houses, troops from the U.S.

Army's 1st Battalion, 506th Infantry Regiment, entered several residential buildings, climbing to rooftops to secure the rest of the patrol.

With families huddling in rooms downstairs, U.S. gunners with light machine guns picked off several gunmen firing at their positions.

As U.S. and Iraqi troops withdrew from the area on foot, insurgents maneuvered around them. U.S. and Iraqi soldiers pro-

vided covering fire as their colleagues ran down roads while bullets whisked overhead and ricocheted off houses.

After the Americans reached a U.S. observation post, a mortar round exploded several hundred yards away, sending a plume of gray smoke into the air.

Gunfights between U.S. forces and insurgents occur frequently in Ramadi, a city of about 400,000 people about 70 miles west of Baghdad. Ramadi is the capital of Anbar province, a center of the Sunni-dominated insurgency that includes cities such as Fallujah and Qaim.
